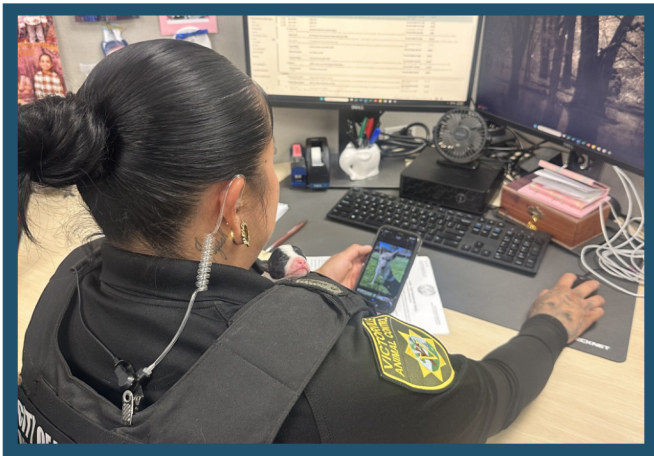
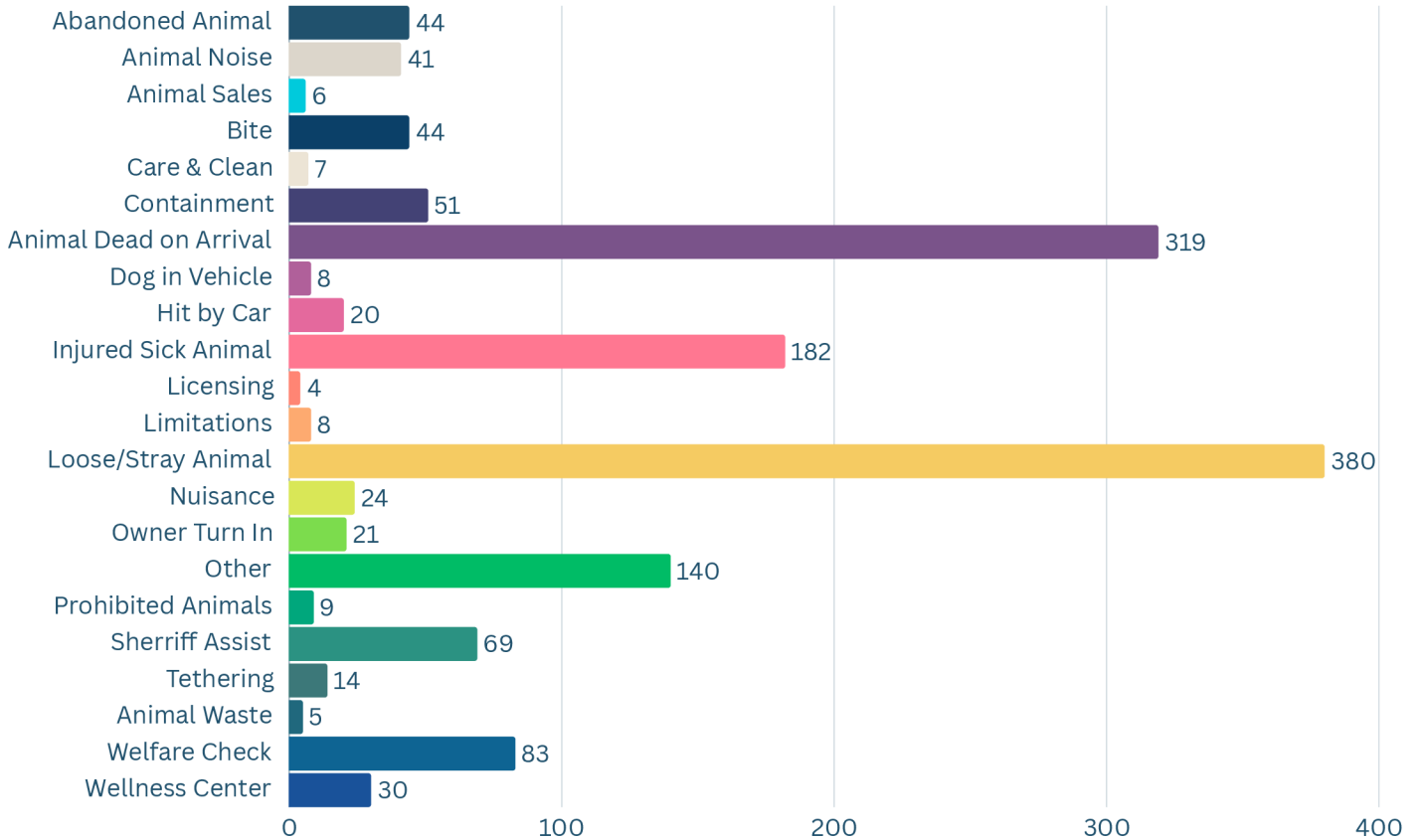

FY 25/26 Q1 Total Inspections and Citations

During the first quarter of FY 25/26, Animal Services completed **2,274** field inspections as part of ongoing efforts to ensure compliance with local animal-related ordinances. As a result of these inspections, **114** citations were issued for various violations. These proactive enforcement activities reflect the department's continued focus on promoting responsible pet ownership and safeguarding public health and safety.

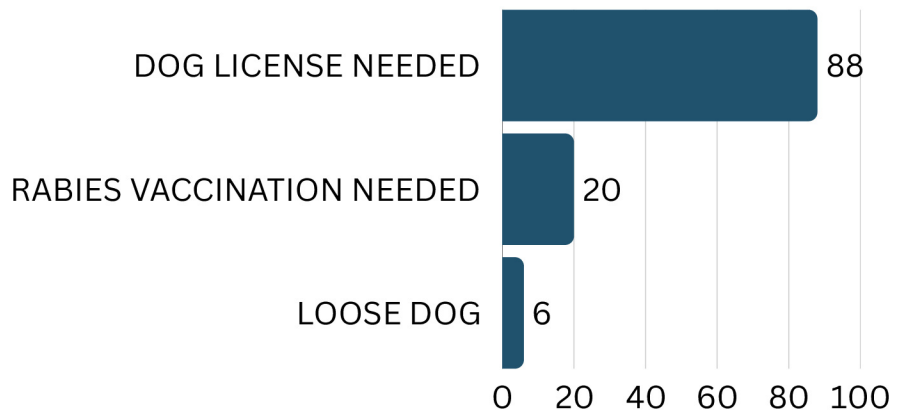
Administrative Hearings

The Animal Services Division is committed to a fair and open process. When an animal is seized due to being potentially vicious or dangerous, the Animal Services Division provides the animal owner with an opportunity to express their position to reclaim their pet. The hearing is conducted before an independent administrative hearing officer where animal containment measures are placed to ensure public safety and to reunite the pet with its owner.

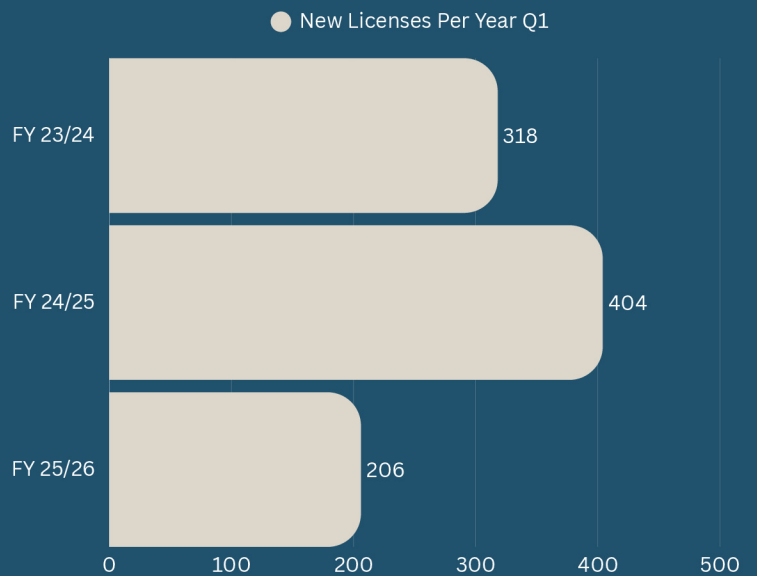
In Q1 of FY 25/26, Potentially Vicious/Dangerous Animal hearings were held for **eight (8) dogs** to assess potential public safety risks. Of these, **six (6) dogs** were found to be either potentially dangerous or vicious.

ANIMAL LICENSING & PROGRAMS



FY 25/26 LICENSES AND RENEWALS

Monthly licensing events at the new Animal Care and Adoption Center continue to support responsible pet ownership in the community. In Q1, **206** dogs were licensed and **281** renewals were issued.

Licensing benefits:

- Helps reunite lost pets with their owners.
- Eases shelter capacity by reducing intake.
- Free pick-up of deceased licensed pets to assist grieving pet owners.



MICROCHIPPING



Microchipping plays a key role in reducing shelter intake and is a simple but effective tool that supports long-term positive outcomes for both pets and their owners.

In Q1 of FY 25/26, Animal Services microchipped **174** pets through licensing events, return-to-owner efforts, and licensing renewals.

VICTORVILLE ANIMAL CARE AND ADOPTION CENTER STATS

This quarter, the Animal Care and Adoption Center continued to experience steady activity, with **392 animals impounded** and **86 adoptions completed** between July - September. The Center also completed numerous spay and neuter surgeries as part of its continued effort to reduce pet overpopulation and support responsible pet ownership.



As part of our ongoing efforts to promote responsible pet ownership and reduce pet overpopulation, a total of **102 spay/neuter surgeries were performed** this quarter. These efforts, combined with community outreach, adoptions, microchipping, and licensing events, continue to strengthen our commitment to animal welfare and public safety.

MAJOR ANIMAL CRUELTY RESPONSE

Animal Services, in coordination with the Victorville Police Department, recently led an enforcement operation related to an illegal rooster fighting case, resulting in the seizure of **512** poultry. This was a major effort that required an all-hands-on-deck response. Fines and expenses were assessed to the property owner.

We are extremely proud of our staff for their dedication, professionalism, and teamwork throughout this operation. From field response to animal care, every team member played a critical role. We extend our thanks to all who supported this case and remain committed to upholding animal welfare in our community.
