## DISPOSING OF YOUR SHARPS

Effective September 1, 2008, State law makes it illegal to dispose of **sharps** (hypodermic needles, pen needles, intravenous needles, and lancets) in the trash or recycling bin, or composting bins.

All needles should be treated as if they carry a disease. That means that if someone gets stuck with a needle, they could get infected with a disease that may be on the needle. Therefore, they would have to get extensive medical tests and worry about whether they have caught a harmful or deadly disease. You have the power to prevent a situation like this simply by safely disposing of your sharps. Do not place others at risk when safe alternatives are currently available.

## SAFE PACKAGING



The safest and required method to package your sharps is in an approved red or clear sharps container. The sharps container is puncture-resistant and, once sealed, cannot spill. This container is considered full when it has been filled to three quarters of its capacity. At this point, the container should be permanently sealed and returned to a disposal location as soon as possible.

Sharps containers can be purchased both online or at your local Rite Aid, Target with pharmacy, Walgreens and Wal-Mart. Replacement containers are available at your local Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) Collection Facility.

## TRAVELING WITH SHARPS

Don't forget, safe needle disposal is important no matter where you are - at home, at work, or on the road. Never place used needles in the trash on airplanes, in hotel rooms, or in public restrooms.

Be prepared - ask about options for safe needle disposal when you make travel reservations. If you aren't sure that the needle containers will be available where, and when, you are going, be sure to buy a needle container that can hold your used needles until you can properly dispose of them.

## WHY ARE SHARPS DANGEROUS

Needles can injure people, can spread germs (hepatitis and HIV/AIDS), damage recycling equipment, and require people to be tested for years for HIV and hepatitis if they are stuck.

To avoid needle sticks at home and protect garbage and recycling workers, DO NOT do the following:

- Don't throw used needles, syringes, or lancets in the garbage/trash, whether at home or away from home.
- Don't put needles in recycling containers.
- Don't flush needles down the toilet.
- Don't put needles into used plastic milk jugs, bleach or soda bottles.
- Don't handle someone else's syringe.
- Don't overfill sharp containers.
- Don't place non-sharps items in your sharps containers (pills, wound dressings, surgical instruments, and other large metal parts, hard, heavy plastics, glass, fabrics, thermometers).

To properly and legally dispose of needles, DO the following:



- Do use only approved sharps container for sharps disposal.
- Do obtain an approved container and transfer sharps before transport and disposal.
- Do place a secure lid on the sharps container.
- Do check with your HHW Program to verify home-generated sharps collection sites.
- Do ask your HHW Program for clarification on sharps management and disposal, if necessary.
